

Mycoplasma



Ureaplasma is a group of bacteria that inhabit the urinary and reproductive tracts in our bodies.

How do you get Mycoplasma?

It's passed on through unprotected sex (sex without a condom) and is particularly common in sexually active people.



Symptoms



Symptoms in men can include:

- Pain when peeing.
- White discharge from the tip of the penis.
- Burning or itching in the urethra (the tube that carries urine out of the body)
- Discomfort or discharge from your anus if you have had anal sex
- Pain in the testicles.

Symptoms

Symptoms in men can include:


- Pain when peeing.
- Unusual vaginal discharge.
- Pain in the tummy or pelvis.
- Pain during sex.
- Bleeding after sex.
- Painful bleeding between periods
- Discomfort or discharge from your bum if you have had anal sex.

Treatment

This is usually treated with a short course of antibiotics to kill the bacteria that caused the infection.

Preventing Mycoplasma





You're most at risk if you have a new sexual partner or do not use a barrier method of contraception, such as a condom, when having sex.

You can help to prevent the spread of Mycoplasma by:

- Using a condom every time you have vaginal or anal sex.
- Not sharing sex toys.If you do share sex toys, wash them or cover them with a new condom between each person who uses them.

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
